Audit Findings

Audit Narrative

The Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) Community Confinement Facilities on-site audit of the Salvation Army Federal Re-Entry Center, West Palm Beach, Florida was conducted on July 8-9, 2019 by The Nakamoto Group, Inc. certified PREA Auditor Diane Lee. Instructions for the upcoming audit were sent approximately 6 weeks prior to the audit and included the PREA Audit Notices. Directions included the posting of the notices in all areas where both residents and staff were able to observe, the date of when to post, how to complete the Pre-audit Questionnaire and how to provide requested documentation. The facility responded in a timely fashion that allowed for the auditor to review documents prior to the on-site visit. Prior to the audit, the auditor contacted the Director and discussed additional information requested and the logistics of the audit. Pre-audit preparation included a thorough review of all documentation and materials submitted by the facility along with the data included in the completed Pre-Audit Questionnaire. The documentation reviewed included agency policies, procedures, forms, education materials, training curriculum, organizational charts, and other PREA related materials that were provided to demonstrate compliance with the PREA standards.

The Salvation Army Federal Residential Re-Entry Center (RRC) is a private, non-profit, community based residential center with a current in-house population of 65 male and female adults. They have an additional 34 residents on Home Confinement. During the audit, 13 of the residents were female. The facility employs 19 staff members who have regular contact with residential clients. The Salvation Army Federal Re-Entry Center is a tri-fold mechanism which serves as a placement for residents transitioning out of prison, awaiting trial or as an additional structure for Federal probation residents. Federal Pre-Trial Services, Federal Bureau of Prisons and the United States Probation Service refer residents within the Southern District of Florida to the program. The average placement is 30-150 days depending on the referring agency's mandate and resident needs/progress. Federal Re-entry is comprised of three programmatic components: Correction Component (CC), Pre-Release Component (PR) and House Confinement Component (HC).

At the beginning of the on-site audit, an "in-briefing" meeting was held with the RRC Director/PREA Compliance Manger. The facility Director just started on the job on April 1, 2019 and has worked very hard to ensure PREA compliance for the facility. The audit process was discussed during the briefing. The Director provided a variety of documents that included current residents and staff scheduled to be at the facility for the next two days. The auditor reviewed these documents and selected 15 random residents to interview. During the on-site audit, the auditor was provided a private office in the facility from which to work and conduct

confidential interviews. Formal personal interviews were conducted with facility staff and residents. The auditor interviewed 15 residents. There were no residents with physical disabilities, none that self-identified as being a member of the LGBTI community, no limited English proficient (LEP), or had made an allegation of sexual abuse. Three of the residents were females. Residents were interviewed using the recommended DOJ protocols that question their knowledge of a variety of PREA protections generally and specifically their knowledge of reporting mechanisms available to residents to report abuse or harassment.

Ten specialized staff members were interviewed and randomly selected Resident Monitors. Specialty staff interviewed include Agency PREA Coordinator/Divisional Director of Corrections, Facility Director/PREA Compliance Manager, Employment Coordinator, and Case Managers. Staff were interviewed using the DOJ protocols that inquired about their PREA training and overall knowledge of the agency's zero tolerance policy, reporting mechanisms available to residents and staff, the response protocols when a resident alleges abuse, and first responder duties.

The Salvation Army Federal Re-Entry Center report zero allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment in the past 12 months. After the initial meeting, a tour of the facility was conducted. All areas were toured including sleeping quarters, bathrooms, day rooms, gymnasium, laundry room, supply room, dining hall, patio, and the administration offices. The auditor observed among other things the facility configuration, location of cameras and mirrors, staff supervision of residents, housing room layout including shower/toilet areas, placement of posters and PREA informational resources, security monitoring, resident entrance and search procedures, and resident programming. The auditor noted that shower areas allow residents to shower separately and shower stalls have plastic curtains for additional privacy. Notices of the PREA audit were posted throughout the facility in common areas. It is clear that the leadership of the RCC have made PREA compliance a high priority and have expended great effort to ensure the sexual safety of residents in their care. It was further evident that staff and residents were invested in the PREA as demonstrated through their knowledge and understanding of the protections and requirements.

Facility Characteristics

The Salvation Army Federal Re-Entry Center is located in West Palm Beach, FL. The Salvation Army is a legal not-for-profit charitable organization. Authority to manage the business is delegated from the Territorial Headquarters to the Divisional Headquarters, then to designated officers of the corps. Individual facilities are also responsible to the requirements specific in the contract that funds the program. The mission statement: "The Salvation Army, international movement, is an evangelical part of the universal Christian church. Its message is based on the Bible. Its ministry is motivated by the love of God. Its mission is to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ and to meet human needs in His name without discrimination".

This center has provided services to 225 residents in the past 12 months. This two-story building sits on a large site that includes other types of rehabilitative services. The facility and grounds were well maintained, and include a large grassy area near the entrance and individual housing for other programs. The facility has time-phased and restricted areas for this resident population to prevent interaction with residents from other programs. There have been no allegations of inappropriate behavior that were identified as sexual abuse or sexual harassment. Housing both male and female residents, the facility separates opposite gender residents by placing the female residents on the first floor of the building. The first-floor houses female sleeping quarters, day room, administrative offices, dining, gymnasium and linen supply storage. The second floor provides male sleeping quarters, day room, laundry room and supply room. Both floors contain a general bathroom areas for resident use. There is an outdoor patio that provides seating and tables for resident and staff use. There is a monitoring system that provides sufficient coverage of the facility. There is a PREA information board on the first floor that the PREA audit notices, as well as other PREA related information for residents were posted. The dining hall serves 3 different groups for meals in order to keep residents separate, as well as the gymnasium schedule that allows only one group of residents at a time. The two day-rooms contain windows that allow for supervision of these areas.

The Corrective Component is the most restrictive placement. With the exception of employment and approved program activities, movements such as errands and family passes, are prohibited while in this phase. The Pre-Release Component encompasses a progressive level system: Acceleration through the level system depends largely on the individual's program focus, diligence in satisfactorily achieving program goals and demonstration of pro-social behaviors. Weekend passes are afforded to assist the resident in establishing family and community ties. Pre-Release status is maintained until it is perceived by the program review team that the resident will derive no further benefit from in-house placement. The Home Confinement Component, authorized by the Federal Bureau of Prisons, consists of the resident living in the community at an approved location. Each resident develops a Personalized Program Plan which includes: financial planning, renewal of positive family and community ties, employment stability, educational planning, medical referrals, drug, alcohol or mental health aftercare referrals and housing referrals/release planning.

The interviews of residents reflected that they were aware of and understood the PREA protections and the agency's zero tolerance policy. Residents receive written materials at intake and a video that provide detailed information about PREA protections, the multiple ways to report sexual abuse or harassment and ways to protect themselves from abuse. During the interviews, the residents indicated they understand the various ways to report abuse and discussed the posters throughout the facility with the telephone number to call to report sexual abuse or harassment. Residents consistently indicated to the auditor that they felt safe in the facility. All facility staff interviewed indicated they had received detailed PREA training and could articulate the meaning of the agency's zero tolerance policy. Staff were knowledgeable about their roles and responsibilities in the prevention, reporting and response to sexual abuse and sexual harassment. Staff consistently articulated the variety of reporting mechanisms for residents and staff to use to report sexual abuse or sexual harassment. Additionally, staff were well trained on the PREA first responder's protocol for any PREA related allegation and staff could clearly articulate exactly the steps they would follow if they were the first responder to an incident.

In summary, after reviewing all pertinent information and after conducting resident and staff interviews, the auditor found that agency leadership have clearly made PREA compliance a high priority and have devoted a significant amount of time and resources to policy development, training of staff and education of residents on all the key aspects of the PREA. Discussions with RCC leadership reinforced the agency's commitment to ensuring the sexual safety of residents and staff in the facility. When the on-site audit was completed, another meeting was held with the Director to discuss audit findings. The facility was found to be fully compliant to the PREA. All interviews and observations also supported compliance. The facility staff were found to be cooperative and professional. Staff morale appeared to be very good and the observed staff/resident relationships were determined to be very good. At the conclusion of the audit, the auditor thanked the Director and staff for their hard work and dedication to the PREA audit process.

Policy 2-1-14 and 10-1-1 details the agencies commitment to providing a safe environment for residents. The facility has a written policy mandating zero tolerance toward all forms of sexual abuse and sexual harassment. The facility has a written policy outlining how it will implement the facility's approach to preventing, detecting, and responding to sexual abuse and sexual harassment. The policy includes definitions of prohibited behaviors regarding sexual abuse and sexual harassment. The policy includes sanctions for those found to have participated in prohibited behaviors. The policy includes a description of facility strategies and responses to

reduce and prevent sexual abuse and sexual harassment of residents. There is a dedicated Agency PREA Coordinator who holds the official title of Divisional Director of Corrections. During his interview, he stated that he finds enough time to work with his normal duties and to work at PREA requirements. He reported a good working relationship with the Federal Bureau of Prisons (BOP) from where most residents are referred to his programs. The Center's Director is also the PREA Compliance Manager, along with assistance from the Operations Manager. All are identified within the agency's organizational structure.

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Policy 2-2-2, 2-1-14 and 10-1-1 addresses the staffing patterns for the center. The staffing plan includes the provision for a set number of posts per shift for supervisory staff, as well as identified gender specific posts. Deviations from the staffing plan are well documented; including the use of a form titled "Deviations from Gender Balanced Staffing Pattern". The last staff evaluation for West Palm Beach was completed during the BOP program review evaluation conducted on March 27-29, 2019. The current staffing pattern was established by the contract with the BOP. All vacant positions have been filled. I reviewed the BOP Monitoring report for West Palm Beach. Compliance with the PREA and other safety and security issues are always a primary focus when they consider and review their staffing plan. The auditor reviewed the facility staffing plan and it was determined to be acceptable. The facility has been provided with all necessary resources to support the programs and procedures to ensure compliance with PREA standards. Rounds, including head counts/accounting for every resident and walking through blind spots are done continuously. These are recorded in the Resident Monitor log books, as well as on the SecureManage electronic system. Admission criteria excludes clients with a history of sexual and/or violent offenses. Clients time is very structured. They do not have opportunities to interact with each other or access areas without staff monitoring (showing and attending to personal hygiene and grooming activities excluded). There have been deviation of the approved staffing plan.

The audit included an examination of all video monitoring systems, resident access to telephones, a review of documentation, staff rosters and staff interviews. Interviews with staff confirmed unannounced rounds to all areas of the facility are conducted. RCC utilizes a camera security system to monitor their buildings, inside and outside as well as the passage of individuals through the buildings. According to interview with the Director, there is a plan to improve the lighting on the patio area and additional cameras to be added.

The agency prohibits all cross-gender strip searches or cross gender visual body cavity searches, except in exigent circumstances and only with the approval of the Director. All cross-gender pat searches are prohibited by policy. Pat-searches may be conducted by same gender staff as needed. This policy also addresses the need for gender specific bathroom and sleeping quarters and specific staff announcements when staff of an opposite gender enters a sleeping quarters area. During the tour, the auditor did notice appropriate announcements. Male staff were clear to state that they will always attempt to locate a female staff to enter the female housing areas.

Interviews with residents and staff confirm this as the policy and actual practice of the program on a consistent basis. RCC reports that it has conducted no cross-gender strip or cross-gender visual body cavity searches of residents in the last 12 months. Additionally, no cross-gender pat down searches were conducted. There were no exigent circumstance

searches in any category conducted. The agency has provided continuous training to staff regarding how to conduct cross-gender pat down searches and searches of transgender and intersex residents in a professional manner. Training records were reviewed by auditor.

More comprehensive information is provided during the first 5 days of a resident's arrival. All new arrivals, regardless of prior placement, receive the same education. Education is provided in both Spanish and English, and can be converted to other languages as needed and identified. Interviews confirmed that those who are deaf or visually impaired will be provided information in a way that allows comprehension (written or spoken material). The agency has maintained documentation of resident education and this was reviewed by the auditor. There is a board on the first floor that contains a variety of sexual abuse/sexual harassment material that is available 24/7 to all residents and staff. Residents receive information at time of intake about the zero-tolerance policy, how to report incidents or suspicions of sexual abuse or harassment, their rights to be free from sexual abuse and sexual harassment and to be free from retaliation for reporting such incidents, and regarding facility policies and procedures for responding to such incidents. Staff interviewed indicated that intake education happens on the first day the resident is admitted. This includes a PREA video, PREA information packet and resident handout with extensive PREA information. There are zero tolerance posters throughout the facility with the "hot line" telephone numbers to call to report abuse. Interviews with staff and residents as well as documentation review, support the facility compliance with this standard.

All residents are assessed at intake immediately upon arrival at the facility for their risk of being sexually abused or harassed by other residents or being sexually abusive towards other residents. An intake staff member screens all new arrivals within 24 hours of entering the facility. Staff and resident interviews and a review of documentation confirmed this information. The forms are kept in a secure location that is not accessible to those without permission. No resident is disciplined for not answering questions. A review of random completed forms was conducted by the auditor.
